

- Bolsheviks
 - Russia
 - Vladamir Lenin
 - Communist
 - Soviet Union formed
- In America
 - Reds
 - Red Scare
 - Fear of communism



- A. Mitchell Palmer
 - Communist mailed him bombs
 - Laws passed to allow deportation of immigrants and keep socialist from holding office
 - Ruled unconstitutional by Gitlow v. New York
 - Palmer Raids




Labor Relations

 - New expectations after WWII
- Organized Labor
 - Seen as un-democratic
 - Communist
 - 1919 strikes
 - Failure for organized labor
 - Wilson focused on foreign policy



Limits to Immigration

- Immigration
 - Nativist rise again
 - National Origins Act of 1924
 - Quotas
 - · Klan rose up in society again
 - Against all non-whites including immigrants




- Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti

 - Trial of beliefs
 - Men were anarchist and radicals
 - Made America look bad



Ford and the Assembly Line

- Model T
 - Assembly line
 - Cheaper, easier, faster to make
- Productivity rose across the board
 - Welfare capitalism






Suburbs Emerge

 - Tourism increased




Consumers

Harding Presidency

ELECTION OF 1920


- Warren G. Harding
- Republican
- Landslide Victory
- Normalcy
 - Stood for nothing
 - No stance on League of Nations
 - Appealed to people

- James Cox
- Democrat





- Harding's Policies
 - Cut taxes for rich
 - US Sec of Treasury Andrew Mellon
 - Cut the federal budget
 - Fordney-McCumber Tariff
 - Tariff to help farmers
 - Teapot Dome
 - Secretary of the Interior Albert Fall
 - Accepted bribes to drill on government land in Wyoming
 - Harding died on trip to Alaska
 - Popular upon death then became unpopular




Coolidge Presidency

ELECTION OF 1924

- Calvin Coolidge
- Republican
- Winner!



- John W. Davis
- Democrat



- Coolidge's Policies
 - Got rid of Harding's corrupt officials
 - "Ohio Gang"
 - Same policies
 - Limited Government
- Did not seek 2nd Term

Remaining War Questions

- War debt
 - Couldn't be re-paid
 - Germany falling into economic hard times
- Washington Naval Conference
 - Attempt to prevent an arms race
- Kellogg-Briand Pact
 - Outlawed War
 - France and US

- The flapper
 - Young women of the 1920s
 - Wanted equal rights
 - casual dating accepted
 - double standard still applied



- New Family
 - Rebellious teens
 - Smaller families
 - Birth control
 - Women at work

 - KKK

 - Scandals broke apart Klan
 - Fundamentalism
 - Literal interpretation of the Bible
 - Billy Sunday





- Scopes Trial
 - 1925
 - Dayton, Tennessee
 - · Teacher John Scopes purposely violated the Butler Act
 - No teaching of evolution in schools
 - Clarence Darrow _ Defense
 - Attacked fundamentalism
 - Williams Jennings Bryan _ Prosecution
 - Died just after trial
 - Scopes found guilty

Prohibition

- 18th Amendment
 - People still wanted alcohol
 - Hard to enforce
 - Volstead Act passed to help enforcement
 - · "speakeasies" emerged
 - Homemade alcohol
 - bootleggers
 - Organized crime rose

 - black pride




- African-American Writers
