

The board recognizes and supports the limitations on unauthorized duplication and use of copyrighted materials. The board does not condone any infringement on the property rights of copyright owners. Employees, students, and visitors are prohibited from the use or duplication of any copyright materials not allowed by copyright law, fair use guidelines sanctioned by Congress, licenses, or contractual agreements. Willful or serious violations also are considered to be in violation of expected standards of behavior for employees and students and may result in disciplinary action in accordance with board policy.

Unless allowed as “fair use” under federal law, permission must be acquired from the copyright owner prior to copying copyrighted material. Fair use is based on the following standards: the purpose and character of the use; the nature of the copyrighted work; the amount of and the substantiality of the portion used in relation to the copyrighted work as a whole; and the effect of the use upon the potential market for, or value of, the copyrighted work.

The superintendent or designee shall develop administrative procedures detailing copyright guidelines for the school system. The procedures should include information on obtaining copyright permissions and licensing and purchasing agreements. The procedures must also provide for information and training to personnel and students, as appropriate, on the fair use of copyrighted materials, including in the following circumstances: single and multiple copying for instructional purposes; copying for performances and displays; off-air recording of copyrighted programs; use of “for home use only” videotapes or DVDs; computer software; copyrighted materials on the Internet and on-line databases; and reproduction and loan of copyrighted materials by school media centers.

System and building-level administrators shall implement the policy and procedures; maintain appropriate records of permissions, agreements, and licenses; and place appropriate warning notices on or near all print, video, and computer equipment capable of making or modifying copies.

The budget recommended by the superintendent to the board must include sufficient funds for purchasing copyrighted materials as a necessary budget expense.
